



The Human Towers of Catalonia —Owain Mckimm

加泰隆尼亞(Catalonia [kætə`lonjə])位於西班牙東北部,與法國、安道爾接壤,該自治區首府為巴塞隆 (Barcelona [/borsə`lonə]),有自己的語言(Catalan [ˈkætələn],亦可作形容詞,指「加泰隆尼亞(人、語)的」) 文化與習俗,數世紀以來,加泰隆尼亞人(Catalonian [kætə`lonjən])已數度嘗試脫離西班牙要求獨立







If you visit the beautiful region of Catalonia in northeastern Spain, you are likely to see many impressive castles, or castells, as they are called in the Catalan language. However, these castles are not made of bricks² and mortar.* They are in fact made of people!

This folk tradition of building human "castles," or towers, has a long history in the region and goes back at least two hundred years. Castells are "built" by teams who are members of a club. There are roughly³ 70 of these clubs in Catalonia today. Members train hard together in preparation4 for their performances,

10 which usually take place in city squares during large festivals.

Originally,5 only men were allowed to take part, and because the average man is 15 fairly heavy, towers were typically fairly small. In the 1980s, however, women

were finally allowed to

participate. This gave the practice a major 20 boost,* as women's lighter bodies allowed the towers to reach unprecedented* heights. Today, some can be up to 10 levels tall!



Building one of these human towers takes great skill, balance,6 and preparation. When the day of the performance comes, the castle-building team carries out several well-rehearsed steps.

First, those who form the tower's wide base move into place. The people there must be strong and stable enough to hold the weight of the whole tower. When the base is ready, those who form the upper levels climb up over their 35 teammates and quickly form the tronk the tall structure8 in the tower's center. Finally, a child climbs to the very top, raises one hand, and sticks out four fingers (which stand for the four bars of the Catalan flag).

This completes the

tower. Then, group





45 by group, they climb down until everyone is safe on the ground. It's all over in less than five minutes!

Tourists might view the building of the towers as simply impressive acrobatic* so acts. But for Catalonians, the towers represent⁹ something very important. To them, these human towers are a way to show their strength¹⁰ as a community* and their pride in Catalonia's culture,

ss identity, and independent spirit. Like
